UNDERGRADUATE AWARDS:

AMIDEAST – Offers need-based and blog-abroad scholarships to U.S. citizens and permanent resident students accepted to **AMIDEAST programs only**. Awards range from \$500-\$5,000, typically, and preference is given for first-generation college students, students demonstrating academic excellence, and those underrepresented in study abroad. For more information, see the link above. **Deadlines** are typically March 15 (summer abroad), April 15 (fall/academic year abroad), and October 15 (spring abroad).

Benjamin A. Gilman International Scholarship Program - This scholarship is the largest study abroad scholarship in the nation, awarding over 2,800 awards annually for undergraduate U.S. students who are **Pell grant eligible**. Selected recipients are awarded up to \$5,000, depending on the length of their program, to defray the costs associated with studying abroad (credit-bearing internships now eligible for funding as well). Addtl funding for Critical-Need Languages is available as well. Non-Western world study abroad is particularly emphasized. **Deadline** typically **early October** for spring/early summer; **early March** for summer, fall, and academic year applications.



Interested students should contact the **Office of Scholars and Fellowships**, fellowships@richmond.edu, or (804) 662-3060, as this award is competitive and assistance can be given with the application process.

Boren Scholarships – Boren awards provide support to U.S. undergraduates who will pursue the study of languages and cultures currently underrepresented in study abroad and critical to U.S. national security. Service with the U.S. government is required upon graduation. **World regions included are Africa, Asia, Central & Eastern Europe, Eurasia, Latin America, and the Middle East**. The countries of Western Europe, Canada, Australia, and New Zealand are excluded. Maximum award is \$8,000/summer, \$10,000/semester, or \$20,000/academic year (summer + semester or year is also possible). Summer only awards are restricted to **STEM** fields (science, technology, engineering, or math). Boren special initiatives include an **ROTC** Initiative as well as **African and South Asian Languages Initiatives**. Webinars are also available--click [here](#) for the schedule.



Interested students should contact the **Office of Scholars and Fellowships**, fellowships@richmond.edu, or (804) 662-3060, as this award is competitive and assistance can be given with the application process. **The campus deadline (earlier than the national deadline) is typically early/mid-January for the following academic year.**

Bridging Scholarships - For study abroad in **Japan**. Majors in any field are eligible. Prior Japanese language study is not a prerequisite. Applicants must be U.S. citizens or permanent residents and full time undergraduates at a U.S. college or university. Semester and year-long abroad students can be awarded up to \$2,500 and \$4,000 in scholarship money respectively.

The **deadline is typically early April for fall; early October for spring** (note that application must be received by the deadline; not just postmarked). Typically 75 awards for fall/year and 25 awards for spring. For more information, please click on the web link above.

In addition, [*Morgan Stanley*](#) typically awards two \$7,500 scholarships to undergraduate students who will be studying abroad in Japan for the academic year and who have an interest in economics and international finance. Applicants must submit a research paper on one of two designated public policy topics together with an application for the Bridging Scholarship program. **The application deadline is typically in early April/May for the following academic year.** Click link above for details.

[British Council](#) - Search for a variety of scholarship funding opportunities for study in the UK via this search tool. Click on the link above; when page opens, click to search for scholarships and financial support. Deadlines and eligibility requirements vary.

[BUTEX International Scholarship](#) - Awards for UK study at BUTEX partners (see website for list of [members](#); includes UR partners U. of Bath, East Anglia, Goldsmiths, Lancaster, LSE, Queen Mary, and Warwick). Value of award is £500. Application **deadline** is typically mid-June prior to a semester or year abroad. See link above for more information.

[Charles B. Rangel International Affairs Summer Enrichment Program](#) - This is a 6-week summer program for undergraduates to provide a deeper understanding of current issues and trends in international affairs. The 15 selected Rangel Scholars attend specific classes, participate in local activities (such as visits to the Pentagon, U.S. Congress, etc.), and live at Howard University (in Washington, D.C.). Applicants must be U.S. citizens with at least a 3.2 cumulative GPA. Award includes tuition, housing, 2 meals per day, and air/train travel to the program. Budget-permitting, there is also a \$3,200 stipend, which students will use to cover the cost of books, local transport, and personal expenses. The **deadline** for receipt of applications is typically very early February of the year in which the summer award is granted.



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[Chinese Government Scholarship](#) - This award was established by the Ministry of Education of China (MoE) to provide scholarships to international students and scholars, and is managed by the China Scholarship Council (CSC). Scholarships (both full and partial) are available to *undergraduate* and graduate students, but applicants must be non-Chinese citizens. Awards of varying duration (minimum 1 year) available. See link above for more information. **Deadline: Varies, between January and early April** of year preceding abroad experience. More information about scholarships for China may be found via [100K Strong](#), a foundation aiming to increase the number of U.S. students learning Mandarin and studying in China, or students may access this [guide](#) to Chinese government scholarships.

[Council on International Educational Exchange \(CIEE\)](#) - Various need- and merit-based scholarships totaling five million dollars per year for studying abroad on CIEE's summer, semester, or yearlong programs. Including initiatives such as Global Access Initiative (**GAIN**), Language Intensive Focus Track Scholarship (**LIFT**), Gilman Go Global, and many other awards, CIEE offers scholarships for students including but not limited to: first generation college students, underrepresented social or ethnic groups, academic excellence, documented disability, demonstrated financial need, military veteran/ROTC, specific majors or majors underrepresented in study abroad, like the sciences, and more. **Deadlines:** typically **April 1** for summer, fall semester, and academic year abroad (same year as the start of study abroad

experience); typically **October 15** for spring semester and calendar year abroad (year prior to studying abroad).

Critical Language Scholarships (CLS) - The U.S. Department of State and the American Councils for International Education offer scholarships for intensive overseas study during the summer in "critical need" languages such as Arabic, Azerbaijani, Bangla, Chinese, Hindi, Indonesian, Japanese, Korean, Persian, Portuguese, Punjabi, Russian, Swahili, Turkish, and Urdu. U.S. citizens in all disciplines are encouraged to apply. This program is great for students interested in applying for the Fulbright in the future, as language experience enhances a Fulbright application. The **deadline** is typically in **mid-November** for the following summer.



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DAAD - The German Academic Exchange Service (DAAD) offers scholarships for students planning to study in **Germany** for 4-10 months (some shorter summer study abroad scholarships available for select programs as well). There are multiple awards to select from, including *undergraduate* and postgraduate opportunities. See [DAAD website](#) for additional details well in advance of your study abroad experience, as the deadlines for these awards are very early.



Interested students should contact the **Office of Scholars and Fellowships**, fellowships@richmond.edu, or (804) 662-3060, as this award is competitive and assistance can be given with the application process.

DIS Study Abroad in Scandinavia (DIS-Denmark) – Students accepted to study abroad on the DIS-Denmark program may wish to consider applying for a DIS need-based scholarship or diversity grant. There is also a merit-based Anders Uhrskov (former director) Leadership Scholarship as well as a memorial scholarship for politics students. Award amounts and qualifications vary, depending on award. **Deadlines** are **October 15** for spring, **March 15** for summer, and **April 1** for fall/year. Education New Zealand – Offers excellence and travel awards specific to New Zealand for "Generation Study Abroad" students. Must be U.S. citizens/permanent residents. There is one \$2,000 travel award for airfare plus multiple \$500 'excellence' awards for selecting University of Otago. Minimum 3.0 GPA. The **deadline for spring abroad is typically late November and the deadline for fall abroad is typically late April**.

Forum Award for Academic Achievement Abroad - For students who have already been abroad and who conducted research while abroad, the Forum Award is a great way to showcase your efforts. Each year two students may be nominated by Richmond. If selected for the award, winners are invited to attend the Forum Conference at no cost to present a summary of their research & international experience at a special session. Research papers by the winners may also be published online in [Frontiers](#), an online Forum journal. Each year the national deadline is at the end of August, but students must submit materials earlier for the campus deadline in order to be considered for nomination by Richmond. The **2019 campus deadline is August 20, 2019**. For more information, click on the link above and/or contact abergman@richmond.edu.

Freeman-ASIA – Up to 400 need-based scholarships available for U.S. citizen/permanent resident undergraduates to study abroad in east or southeast Asia. Award amounts vary from \$3,000/summer, \$5,000/semester, and \$7,000/academic year. Award details, webinar information, and the online application are available at the link above. A service project is required upon completion of the study abroad. **Deadlines are typically in early March for summer; early April for fall/academic year; early October for spring.** Interested students should contact abergman@richmond.edu in the Office of International Education, as advisor certification is required as part of the application process.

Fulbright UK Summer Institutes – Award funds summer study in the **UK** for U.S. citizens with at least two years of undergraduate study left to complete who have a minimum 3.7 GPA. Students choose to apply to 1 of 9 participating institutes in the UK. Students in all disciplines are encouraged to apply. The **deadline** to apply for summer is typically in **early February**, depending on the institute. Note: Successful awardees who wish to receive academic credit for the summer program must first [register](#) the experience with the Office of International Education.

Fund for Education Abroad – Up to 70 need-based awards between \$1,250 and \$10,000, depending on the duration abroad, designed to support rigorous language and culture learning for U.S. citizens or permanent residents via high-immersion study abroad experiences. Preference for non-traditional destinations, programs that incorporate service-learning or volunteerism, and populations underrepresented in education abroad (first-generation college students, minorities, etc.). In addition to the general awards, there is a specific award for LGBTQI students and some for students planning to study abroad in a specific country (such as Mexico, Vietnam, Denmark, etc.). **Deadline** is typically in **early January** for summer/fall abroad and **early September** for spring abroad.

Go Overseas Scholarship – This award is for any student applying to study or intern abroad and is not specific to any program or country. Award value: \$500. Number of awards available: 1. **Deadline** to apply: typically early May for fall/year programs, early August for summer programs, and late September for spring programs. Click link above for more information and to apply.

HI USA 'Explore the World' Travel Scholarship – This \$2,000 need-based award is offered by Hostelling International – USA for U.S. citizens/permanent residents in select communities who are aged 18-30 to help finance an experience abroad that includes an educational or service component. See [HERE](#) or the link above for more information and the application. **Deadline: typically early March.**

IES Scholarships - IES offers \$2.5 million in aid to students accepted **to IES programs only**. Both need-based and merit awards are available, with special mention given to the Diversity Merit-Based Scholarship. There are a variety of awards to consider--application deadlines and procedures vary and are listed online. For more information, see the [IES Scholarships](#) webpage. **Deadlines** are typically November 1 (spring/calendar year abroad) / April 1 (summer abroad), and May 1 (fall/academic year abroad). Note: IES also offers additional awards for Boren or Gilman recipients (this funding has a later deadline).

Kosciuszko Foundation - *Undergraduate* and graduate scholarships for U.S. citizens or permanent residents of Polish descent (or those pursuing Polish Studies) to study abroad (semester and year) in **Poland** at Jagiellonian University, a Richmond partner university. Minimum 3.0 GPA required. See [here](#) for additional details. **Deadline for fall/year programs typically early January.**

ProjectGO – This Department of Defense language and culture initiative is for any U.S. citizen **ROTC** student in the Army, Air Force, or Navy for domestic AND study abroad programs focusing on the critical languages and countries in the Middle East, Asia, Central Asia, and Africa. Summer awards available at participating institutions (some institutions have grant funding that supports study abroad during the academic year as well). Summer programs are considered fully funded, but exact benefits vary by program. Participation in ProjectGO will not require additional service commitment. **Deadline to apply is typically mid-January.** See link above.

Rotary International - The Rotary Foundation has restructured and typically now offers scholarship opportunities through district and global grants. This new grant structure gives Rotarians greater flexibility in sponsoring the next generation of leaders. Click the link above for more information. **Deadlines vary.**

School for Field Studies - Offers various need-based scholarships for students applying to SFS programs only. SFS matches Pell Grant funding for eligible students, they have Diversity Scholarships (including for first-generation college students), Travel Grants, and Heritage Scholarships, etc. See the SFS website via the link above for more information and the application. Completed applications must be received **60 days prior** to the start of the SFS semester program (and **30 days prior** to the start of summer programs).

School for International Training - Offers various need-based scholarships totaling approximately 1.6 million dollars/year for students applying to SIT/IHP programs only— individual awards range from \$500-\$5,000. Note: International students accepted to study on SIT programs are eligible for relevant SIT awards. Highlighted awards: SIT has a Bonner Scholar award and matches Pell Grant funding for eligible students. More than 80% of applicants who apply on time receive funding via an SIT scholarship or grant. Scholarship information and the application is available on the SIT website via the link above. **Deadlines** are typically **April 1** (summer), **May 15** (fall), and **November 1** (spring). See link above for more information.

Scott's Cheap Flights Scholarship – Travel site scholarship of \$1,000 for one U.S. citizen/permanent resident (*undergraduate* or graduate) each fall and spring semester to help off-set the cost of studying abroad. Student must submit application and a 500-1,000 word essay. See link for more details. Fall deadline typically **mid-October for spring and mid-March for fall.**

Sons of Italy Foundation Scholarships -- The Sons of Italy Foundation offers 10-12 national leadership merit-based grants of \$4,000-\$25,000 to U.S. citizens of Italian descent (with at least one Italian or Italian-American grandparent), including special study abroad awards. **Italian Language Scholarship:** Student must be a junior or senior majoring/minoring in Italian language studies and must plan to study Italian while abroad. Click the link above or click [here](#) for more information. **National Italian American Bar Association Award** (for **LAW** students): Applicant must be a rising first, second, or third year law student. See [here](#) for details, click on the link for the bar association award. Deadline for fall abroad is typically **late February.**

St Andrews, Scotland Scholarship – The University of St Andrews, a Richmond exchange partner, offers undergraduate study abroad and exchange students an opportunity to apply for one of several need and merit-based scholarships of up to £4,000 for accommodation. Spring abroad deadline typically **early December**; fall abroad deadline typically **early May.** Learn more via the link above (under "Scholarships").

Swedish Women's Educational Association (SWEA), DC – Scholarship funding of up to \$5,000 for study/research in, or related to, **Sweden** available to one student affiliated with a university in Virginia, Maryland, or the Washington, DC area. SWEA's purpose is to support and preserve the Swedish language, history, culture, education, and traditions. Knowledge of Swedish is not a requirement and the application is open to all regardless of gender, race, age, etc. Deadline typically **mid-February** for the following academic year.

Umbra Institute Sister Cities Scholarship: Up to 4 awards for students who will be studying at the Umbra Institute in **Italy** for a semester or year (*though the scholarship itself covers only one semester*), have at least a 2.75 GPA, and have permanent residence in either Grand Rapids, MI or Seattle, WA are eligible for this scholarship. The amount of the award ranges, but is up to \$2,000. **Deadlines** typically June 15th for fall and October 15th for spring. See link above for more information.

Virginia International Business Council Award - Scholarship funds available to students to support their international study activities. To be eligible, student must be a rising undergraduate junior or senior, or a graduate student (including law), having a GPA of 3.0 or higher. Int'l and minority students encouraged to apply. Applicants must submit a written statement of their interest in international business; include a faculty letter of recommendation and a current unofficial/official transcript. Five VAIBC awards are given this year: one at \$1,000, two at \$750 and two at \$500, plus two other awards. **Deadline typically in late-March**. For more information and an application, click the link above.

WWU (University of Muenster) Scholarship - Sponsored by the DAAD (German Academic Exchange Service), this award is for UR students accepted to study abroad at the University of Muenster in **Germany**. The award covers additional living expenses up to 300 Euros/month for up to 10 months. Click for [WWU Scholarship Info](#) and an [application](#). **Deadlines: February 1/August 1 each year.**

POST-GRADUATE AWARDS All students interested in graduate fellowships should contact the **Office of Scholars and Fellowships**, fellowships@richmond.edu, or (804) 662-3060, as these awards are competitive and assistance can be given with the application process. See the UR [Fellowships](#) web page for more information:

Alexander von Humboldt Foundation - Study and research in Germany after graduation. A variety of 6-month to one year scholarships for young professionals are available.

The American Scandinavian Foundation - Study and research in Scandinavia after graduation for U.S. citizens or permanent residents. \$5,000 grants (for 1-3 months abroad) and \$23,000 fellowships (for 1 year abroad) are available. Awards in all fields are possible. Deadline: Typically **November 1** of the year preceding the abroad experience.

Blakemore Freeman Fellowships for Advanced Asian Language Study - These highly-competitive awards are for the advanced study of Asian languages. Students must be U.S. citizens or permanent residents. Support is provided for one year at an approved language

program in East or Southeast Asia. Fellowships are intended to cover the basic expenses of studying (tuition or tutoring fees, travel stipend, living expenses, etc.). For more information, see link above. Deadline: Typically **end of December** of the year preceding the abroad experience.

Boren Fellowship - This award is for U.S. citizens enrolled in or applying to graduate degree programs in the U.S., to support language study and overseas academic study or research, an academic internship, or a combination of these, in countries currently underrepresented in study abroad and critical to U.S. national security. Preference is given to longer lengths of study, to those studying less commonly taught languages, and to students who will make a commitment to work in the federal government post-graduation. **World regions included are Africa, Asia, Central & Eastern Europe, Eurasia, Latin America, and the Middle East.** The countries of Western Europe, Canada, Australia, and New Zealand are excluded. There are also **African and South Asian Flagship Languages Initiatives** in place to specifically enhance the Boren Fellowship award with additional study for specified languages. Up to \$30,000 can be awarded. Webinars are also available--click [here](#) for the schedule. See the UR [Fellowships](#) web page for more information about campus and national deadlines.

Canada Scholarships - Various awards available for post-graduate students studying or conducting research in Canada. Click on the link above. Deadlines and eligibility requirements vary. Awards for Canadians and non-Canadians.

Carnegie Endowment - James C. Gaither Junior Fellows Program - Graduating seniors and recent graduates with strong academic records are encouraged to apply. Twelve to fourteen one-year paid fellowships are offered to uniquely qualified individuals each year. Based in D.C., Junior Fellows provide research assistance on issues such as nuclear policy, democracy building, energy and climate issues, international economies/security, Asia and China-related issues, Middle-East studies, South/Southeast Asian politics, and Russian/Eurasian affairs. Junior Fellows are currently paid a gross salary of \$3,290/month (\$39,500/year) and a full benefits package is also included. See the UR [Fellowships](#) web page for more information about campus and national deadlines.

Charles B. Rangel International Affairs Fellowship - This award is designed to support the graduate study of outstanding students interested in foreign-service work with the U.S. Dept. of State. Graduating seniors and recent graduates with strong academic records are encouraged to apply. Minority groups underrepresented in the Foreign Service and those with financial need are particularly encouraged to apply. Applicants must be a U.S. citizen with at least a 3.2 cumulative GPA. 30 applicants will be awarded up to \$37,500 annually for tuition, room, board, books, and mandatory fees for completion of a two-year master's degree. Program includes two summer internships (one in DC; one overseas). Fellows who successfully complete the program and foreign-service entry requirements will receive appointment as a Foreign Service Officer (5-year commitment). Application deadline is in **mid-September** of the year prior to starting graduate study.

Chateaubriand Fellowship Program - Award is for merit-based post-graduate research funding for 4-9 months in France in the STEM (science, technology, engineering, and math) and Health disciplines **or** HSS (humanities and social sciences) fields. Recipients receive a stipend, round-trip ticket to France, and insurance. Deadlines are typically **early January**. Click link above for more information.

Congress-Bundestag Youth Exchange (CBYX) - The CBYX program offers 75 U.S. citizens or permanent residents the chance to take part in a unique study- and work-abroad fellowship each year. Participants spend 2 months in an intensive German language course, 1 semester

studying at a German university or professional school, and 3 months completing an internship in their career field with a German company. The fellowship covers international airfare, language school and university tuition, accommodation, a living stipend, health insurance, and costs for travel within Germany and seminars throughout the year. Previous knowledge of German is not required but is preferred. Candidates in all fields are encouraged to apply. Deadline: Typically **December 1** of the year preceding the abroad experience.

Copenhagen Business School – CBS, a Richmond partner university, offers some limited, partial scholarships for graduate study, including [funding an MBA](#). See link above for information and the application. **Deadlines** typically between February 1 and March 30 of the year prior to entering CBS graduate program.

DAAD - Funding for study in Germany--there are multiple awards to select from, including undergraduate and *postgraduate* opportunities. See [DAAD website](#) for additional details.

Donald M. Payne International Development Graduate Fellowship – This fellowship provides funding for those interested in a career in international development as a USAID Foreign Service Officer. The program benefits include up to \$96,000 over two years toward a two-year master's degree and include internships in Washington D.C. and at USAID missions overseas. Fellows who successfully complete the program become USAID Foreign Service Officers (5-year commitment). U.S. citizen applicants must have a GPA of at least 3.2 and be U.S. citizens. The program welcomes applications from those with any undergraduate major and encourages applications from members of minority groups historically underrepresented in the USAID Foreign Service and those with financial need. See link above for more information. The application deadline is typically in **December** of the year prior to starting graduate study.

Erasmus Mundus Scholarships - There are multiple graduate awards in a variety of fields linked via this website. Click title above for details.

Fulbright Awards – The Fulbright Program is the largest U.S. international exchange program offering opportunities for students, scholars, and professionals to undertake international graduate study, advanced research, university teaching, and teaching in elementary and secondary schools worldwide. See the UR [Fellowships](#) web page for more information about campus and national deadlines, and for assistance with the application process.

Fulbright mtvU Awards - Up to four awards will be available for students to pursue projects focused on an aspect of international contemporary or popular music as a "cultural force for expression." Applicants must also address how they intend to share their activities with their peers during their Fulbright year abroad. Along with the study of music, other related subjects will be considered, such as music and activism, music and the community, etc. Only students who did not apply to the regular Fulbright grant (above) are eligible to apply to the mtvU award. The deadline was late February. **Program currently suspended (TBD).**

George J. Mitchell Scholarship - This scholarship is for graduate level study in Ireland or N. Ireland. Up to twelve awards are available annually to fund one year of study for each recipient. The award provides for tuition, housing, a living stipend, and international travel stipend. See the UR [Fellowships](#) web page for more information about campus and national deadlines, and for assistance with the application process.

Hardiman Research Scholarships – Structured 4-year fully-funded scholarship for post-graduate education abroad at UR partner university NUI-Galway in Ireland in 5 key fields of study: Humanities in Context (including Digital Humanities); Applied Social Sciences and Public Policy; Environment, Marine, and Energy; Informatics, Data Analytics, Physical and

Computational Sciences; and Biomedical Science and Engineering. See link above for additional information. Deadline in **mid-February** of year prior to start of study.

Japanese Govt. Research Student Scholarship - Open to U.S. citizens to study and research at a graduate school of their choosing in Japan for 1 1/2 to 2 years. Benefits include a monthly stipend, transportation to and from Japan, and tuition. Proficiency in Japanese not required. **Applications typically due in early June** preceding arrival in Japan in the fall. See Consulate General of Japan or consult [checklist](#) for more details.

Korean Government Scholarship Program – This award funds Korean language training, then full tuition at a participating Korean university, a 900,000 *won* monthly living allowance, a research allowance for certain fields, round-trip airfare, insurance, and more for a student who wants to pursue higher education in Korea (citizens of Korea are not eligible and applicants must never have studied in Korea previously, including on exchange). Number of awards available varies. There is a quota per country and per type (15 for the United States are awarded via the Korean Embassy, for example). Duration of award varies depending on degree level (2 year Master's + 1 year language training, for example). **Deadline typically late March**. For more information and to apply, see link above and click [here](#).

Kosciuszko Foundation - Undergraduate and *graduate* scholarships (ranging from \$1,000-\$7,000) for U.S. citizens and permanent residents of Polish descent (applicants of non-Polish descent only considered if primary focus is Polish studies) to study abroad for one academic year (may be renewed for 2nd year) at Jagiellonian U. in Poland, a UR partner university. Marshall Scholarships - Allows up to 40 young Americans (U.S. citizens) annually to go to the United Kingdom and study at the graduate level for two years. GPA must be 3.7 or higher. Organization of American States – Grants scholarships every year for the Pursuit of Master's and Doctoral Degrees and for graduate research that leads to a degree. Wide variety of award types for various academic fields. **Deadlines and details vary** per award. See link above for more detail.

Robert Bosch Foundation Fellowship Program – This 8- or 11-month fellowship opportunity is offered to 15 U.S. citizen awardees to gain language training and professional experience in Germany in the fields of business administration, cultural management, journalism, law, non-profit, public policy, and urban planning. No German language skills required at time of application. Age must be under 40 years old. Ideal candidate will have minimum 5 years of relevant full-time work experience (excluding internships) and a Master's degree (or JD). Monthly stipend, int'l travel, and other costs covered. Deadline: typically **November 1** of the year prior to the abroad experience. See link above for details.

School for International Training (SIT) Alumni Fellowship in Memory of Alice Rowan Swanson – This fellowship opportunity is offered to alumni of the School for International Training (SIT) who wish to return to the site of their SIT/IHP program to pursue further developmental projects that benefit human rights in that region. Applicants should possess attributes similar to Alice, such as passion for learning and interest in world affairs. Preference is given to recent SIT alumni who have finished their program within the past 5 years, and who have not returned to their host country. Applications will be reviewed twice annually—on **March 1 and October 1**. For more information and an application, click the link above.

Scott's Cheap Flights Scholarship – Travel site scholarship of \$1,000 for one U.S. citizen/permanent resident (undergraduate or *graduate*) each fall and spring semester to help off-set the cost of studying abroad. Student must submit application and a 500-1,000 word essay. See link for more details. Fall deadline typically **mid-October for spring and mid-March for fall**.

Thomas R. Pickering Graduate Foreign Affairs Fellowship - The goal of the fellowship program for U.S. citizens is to attract outstanding students (3.2 GPA or above) who enroll in two-year master's degree programs in public policy, international affairs, public administration, or academic fields such as business, economics, political science, sociology, or foreign languages, and who have an interest in pursuing a Foreign Service career in the U.S. Dpt. of State. The fellowship award covers up to \$37,500 annually. Graduate-level fellows receive stipends during participation in one domestic summer internship between the first and second year of graduate school and one overseas summer internship following the second year of graduate school. Each successful candidate is obligated to a minimum of five years of service in an appointment as a Foreign Service Officer.
